Training Program

LDAH has a comprehensive training program offering workshops to the community on the islands of Oʻahu, Maui, Kauaʻi, Hawaiʻi, Molokaʻi, and Lanaʻi. Workshops provide various educational content and last from one to six hours. Parent, professional, and youth workshops are scheduled through the LDAH Education & Training Coordinator.



Building the Foundation The Law: IDEA 2004 and Hawai'i's Administrative Rules

Learn about the Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act of 2004 and Hawai'i's Administrative Rules, and how they are designed to meet the unique needs of students with disabilities.

Understanding the Evaluation Process

Become familiar with the evaluation process and different assessments available for your children. Learn how to understand and utilize specific information from reports, and prepare for eligibility determination and the development of the Individualized Education Program (IEP).

Developing the IEP

Become familiar with the process of developing, reviewing, and revising an Individualized Education Program as an IEP team according to standards presented in IDEA 2004 and Hawai'i's Administrative Rules.
