

Project Kealahou is a 6-year, Substance Abuse Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) funded initiative that works across systems (juvenile justice, child welfare, mental health, and education) to provide adolescent girls who have been impacted by significant trauma to reconnect with their land, themselves and their families.

The Project is housed in the Child and Adolescent Mental Health Division within the Department of Health. The main goals of the Project are three fold:

- 1. Direct service with adolescent girls ages 11-18 years old.
 - a. Service includes: structured support groups, one on one therapy, youth and cultural activities, community service projects, peer mentoring development
- 2. Practice Development with Key Community Treatment agencies
- 3. Developing the Interagency System of Care

Project Kealahou will strive to deliver services with the SAMHSA System of Care principles of; familydriven, youth-guided, culturally and linguistically resonant, and trauma-informed.
