

HFYC started in 2001 as a youth led initiative. Since that time, hundreds of HFYC youth members helped bring about positive change in the child welfare system and in the lives of transition age foster youth.

In 2008, 21 youth were present at the Child and Family Services Review making Hawaii the only state at that time that actually had youth attending. Recognize any of those faces?



HFYC made three requests for the Youth Opportunities Initiative and after spending years developing collaborations and local support, HFYC members were the only youth present at the third meeting advocating for the Youth Opportunities Initiative to come to Hawaii. And, it did. HFYC members became HIHOPES board members, helping it succeed.

Introduction

What does "Not Bound By Blood" mean?

Youth that are removed from their parents for abuse or neglect are torn from their Blood, which impacts their understanding of:

- Culture
- Family norms
- Human Interaction
- Permanent connections

The Problems

 high rate of emotional and behavioral problems, and functioning challenges.

 limited or stagnated in the development of their personal and cultural identities.

 attachment issues as well as challenges in experiencing permanent connections.

Possible causes for this problem

Problem: high rate of emotional, behavioral, and functioning challenges.

- •Multiple placement changes contribute to a youth's behavioral problems. (Newton, Litrownik & Landsverk, 2000)
- •Placements with non-relative caregivers or in institutionalized facilities tend to have negative impacts.
- •Apathetic attitudes from social workers, resource parents and service providers perpetuate risk-factor behaviors. (Lawrence, Carson & Egeland, 2006).

Possible Causes for these problems

Problem: Youth in care may be limited or stagnated in the development of their personal and cultural identities. Separating youth from their biological family leads to attachment issues and challenges in experiencing permanent connections.

 Due to complex placement patterns siblings are less likely to be placed in foster care on the same day. (Wulczyn and Zimmerman, 2005)

Limited resource placements.

Differing permanency timelines, age variations

and the diversity of needs for each youth.

Organizational barriers and policy challenges.

The Solution

 By understanding and implementing the ideas of Ohana and Hanai, we can help these problems.

Ohana: (n) family in an extended sense of the term including blood-related, adoptive or intentional.

Hanai: (v) to adopt, to be close, to nourish, to sustain. That includes lui, ho`okama, and kahu.



The Solution -Hanai

- Developing permanence within the Resource Family.
 - -Role in creating a nurturing home that demonstrates unconditional love
 - -Exampling of love fulfills the absence of that relationship that was supposed to be built by biological parents
 - -Identify strengths and positive components of your relationship
 - -Maintain connection, even after youth exits



The Solution - Ohana

- Supporting the continued natural development of a youth's personal and cultural identity.
 - Do not remove personal connection to maintain professional context
 - -Create opportunities for youth to share about themselves
 - -Maintain their connection with their siblings
 - Select appropriate resource family placements

The Solution - Ohana

- Fostering life long permanence through the maintenance of sibling relationships.
 - -Priority in joint placement of siblings
 - -Prioritize sibling visitations
 - -Resource family has most crucial role in this obligation

The Solution - Ohana & Hanai

 Instilling a permanent connection to all human beings.







Conclusion

- "Not Bound By Blood" represents the idea of extended connections through the Hawaiian cultural concepts of Ohana and Hanai.
- Foster youth possess a perspective unique and independent of all other human beings
- The cultivation of this perspective amongst our youth in care shifts the paradigm from victimized to victorious
- How we harness these ideas can provide youth with unlimited potential to become incredible leaders because of their life experiences, hardships and traumatic histories.
