Biracial and bicultural, Dr. C. Kimo Alameda grew up on the Big Island, a living example of multicultural Hawai'i. She is also employed at Hale Kipa as a CAMHD paraprofessional and at Catholic Charities Hawai'i as a resource family co-trainer for child-specific families. Jenna Robinson believes music and poetry are the perfect tools to heal from trauma and grief, for they empower people to reclaim their past. After the passing of her brother in 2010 Jenna taught herself how to play over eight instruments and turned to open mics for musical therapy. She has performed across the U.S. as a street musician and as a part of several national slam poetry teams. Jenna holds a B.A. in History and Ethnic Studies from the University of Hawai'i-Manoa. Her poetry performances and workshops are centered on cultural and queer identity, grief, trauma informed care, historical re-education, and community building. Jenna currently works for Girls Court at the Hawai'i State Judiciary. She also works with several youth based organizations to inspire the therapeutic nature of writing and spoken arts performance.

Melody Rolnick is a former foster youth full of passion and determination. She graduated from high school in Kihei, Maui and earned a bachelor's degree in psychology from UH Manoa in December 2013. In January of 2014 Melody joined the 'Ohana at Family Programs Hawaii and is currently pursuing her passion to motivate foster youth with the Youth Empowerment and Success program (YES Hawai'i). She was also a member of Cal's track and field team.
